

Brief Explanation of Types of Dog Breeder

Local Authority Licensed Breeder, Higher Standard	 Breed three or more litters per year, must have a LA licence Details of mother and father given to buyer, including any inherited diseases both parents' breed is prone to No mating if tests results indicate risk of inherited disease No more than four litters per mother Coefficient of Inbreeding (COI) and health test results required No breeding allowed if COI of puppies exceeds 12.5% Puppy Contract includes warranties for health and socialisation Minimum one unannounced inspection every 36 months by LA inspector and vet
Breed Club Member	 Members of a KC affiliated breed club have access to information about breed health, including the Breed Health and Conservation Plan (BHCP)

- Should follow the Kennel Club's Code of Ethics
- Some breed clubs may recommend or require certain health tests
- Annual membership fee (variable)
- Must register puppies with the Kennel Club (£16 per puppy) and confirm pedigree (family tree)
- Usually 'show breeders' ie attend KC run dog shows, exhibit their 'best' dogs and compete for prizes
- Access to KC online tools, such as Mate Select and Estimated Breeding Values (EBVs)
- Puppy buyer pays the KC £16 to re-register the puppy in their name

Unlicensed breeder (including hobby breeder, family dog breeder, backyard breeder)

- May or may not breed purebred dogs
- May or may not register puppies with the Kennel Club
- Should breed only one or two litters per year
- May or may not health test parents
- May or not take into account genetic diversity
- Standards of care and expertise vary
- Selection for temperament may or may not be considered
- Socialisation and habituation may or may not be done well

Home Breeders Association (HBA) Breeder (politically active group which aims to protect its members from the 'intrusive bureaucracy' required by the 2018 Regulations).

- Includes licensed and unlicensed breeders.
- Has a Code of Practice which all breeders must agree to
- Should carry out health tests 'recommended by a vet'
- No Puppy Contract
- Includes breeders of other species

Breeder who registers puppies with the Kennel Club (but not a member of a breed club)

- Breeds pedigree dogs
- Puppies will have a pedigree certificate showing family background
- Health testing may or may not be carried out
- Genetic diversity may or not be taken into account
- Advised to follow the KC's Code of Ethics
- Will not have easy access to breed health information
- Standards of health, care and expertise will vary

Local Authority Licensed Breeder, Lower Standard

- These will include large scale commercial breeding establishments which fulfil the minimum requirements for health, welfare and socialisation
- Some may be classed as 'puppy farms'
- Should be inspected every year by a local authority inspector and vet
- Will often try to deliver puppies to avoid puppy buyers seeing their premises

ADCH Registered Rescue Charities • Homing Contract which covers welfare and owner responsibilities • Dogs checked by a vet before rehoming • Premises checked by ADCH assessors • Socialisation and habituation carried out
